





Neighborhood Business Districts

- 11 Property Assessment Districts
 - 10 Maintenance Assessment Districts (MADs)
 - Downtown Property and Business Improvement District (PBID)
- 18 Business Improvement Districts (BIDs)





What is a MAD?

In a Maintenance Assessment District (MAD), property owners within a defined geographical area pay an assessment on their property tax bill for improvements and activities over and above what the City normally provides ("special benefit").





- District Management Plan and Engineer's Report approved at time of formation outlines services.
 - Litter and graffiti abatement, landscape maintenance, trash collection, as well as a variety of maintenance and economic development services.
- Legal authority
 - Proposition 218 (State)
 - Maintenance Assessment District Procedural Ordinance (Local)
 - City Council Policy 100-21



Economic Development Department

Contract Compliance and Oversight

EDD is committed to supporting nonprofit partners with meeting contract requirements and managing effective business districts.

- Attend monthly Board meetings for all nonprofits managing Business Districts
- Provide contract and budget oversight and support
- Offer best practices for contract compliance
- Connect partners with City resources, programs, and services
- Respond to complaints received regarding execution of contracts and work with contractors to come into compliance











About Urban Forestry

The City of San Diego Urban Forestry program <u>plants</u>, <u>maintains</u>, <u>protects and promotes trees</u>.

- Over 250,000 street trees & about 600,000 park trees
- Tree maintenance
 - 50,000+ palm & shade trees pruned every year by Parks & Transportation Departments
- Get It Done 6,000 street tree requests per year
 - Emergency tree trimming/removals for public safety
 - Street tree planting requests through Free Tree SD
- 1,200 park and street trees planted in FY23



Trees For Communities


December 6, 2022 Council passed a resolution to settle with the Air Pollution Control District, approving a Supplemental Environmental Project to plant trees.

- \$4.6 million to create a multi-year tree planting program.
 - Plant 1000s of new trees, expand existing tree wells, create new tree wells
- Launched in January 2024, scheduled to complete by December 2028.
- First tree plantings scheduled for April of 2024.
- The City will exhaust all feasible tree planting locations.
- Program to focus on historically underserved communities.

Benefits of Trees

- Livable communities
 - Trees create shade and cool off the community
 - Walkable neighborhoods
 - Improved business activity
- Air quality & ecosystem benefits
 - Reduce air pollution levels
 - Port of San Diego and San Ysidro Border Crossings
- Climate mitigation
 - Stormwater runoff
 - Carbon storage/sequestration



What To Expect

- Under this program the City will:
 - Acquire and plant new trees on City owned land.
 - Water trees for 3 years and provide ongoing tree maintenance.
 - Create new planting spaces in paved parkways.
 - Increase planting spaces width when needed.
- Mature trees years after planted:
 - Increased benefits to the community with shade and a host of other ecosystem benefits.





Outreach, Community and Logistics

- Community outreach, input, meetings, workshops & educational opportunities
- Tree Planting & Preparation
 - List of vacant spots provided by Urban Corps of SD County
 - White paint mark outs for future trees
 - Door hanger left with program information
 - Tree species selected by staff, with community input
 - Trees planted & 2nd door hanger with tree species information
- Tree planting events

Promise Zone

- Project overlaps communities located in the Promise Zone
 - Barrio Logan, Logan Heights, Sherman Heights, Stockton, Mountain View, Southcrest
- Phase One tree planting set to begin in Logan Heights in April
- Improving quality of life of Promise Zone residents
 - Supports opportunities for active living with better walkability
 - Creates safer neighborhoods with decrease in crime
 - More appealing neighborhoods
- Arbor Day Memorial Community Park on Friday, April 26
 - In collaboration with Parks & Recreation
 - Goal to plant 100 trees
 - Volunteers needed
